We invite papers in three areas:

'Ecclesiology and Islam': Invited topics: historical and contemporary relationships between Islamic faith communities and churches; concepts of co-existence; multiple belonging; method in inter-faith encounters; relations in the Middle East, Islamic states, in Christian-dominated states; comparative theological papers concerning 'Religion and Community' (a la Keith Ward's 2000 study).

Ecclesiology and Church Law: Reflections on the relationship between ecclesiology and church law in different denominations invited, particularly interactions with wider debates raised by Ladislas Orsy's *Receiving the Council*, 2009.
